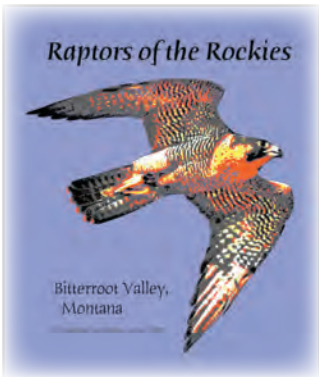

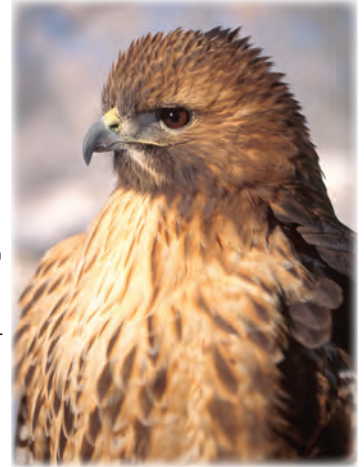

We did the math and yes, just completed 30 years of Raptors of the Rockies, and a little Round-Up to reflect on the highlights. Looking back at our annual reports from the early 1990's I wonder why and how I managed to keep it together without going crazy - four assemblies in a row, three schools a day, seven birds per program in one of the seven Subarus I've had since the start. And the birds - an Osprey named Flipper,

Cooper's Hawk called Alice (get it?), and the myriad with monikers for Formula One race car drivers (Mika Hawkinen) and jazz musicians like Miles (Davis.) These birds are our family and always so awful to lose a member.

We could tally the miles, mice, quail, squirrels, MEAT and money that this outfit has consumed but would probably scare us to death. I can tell you that we've enjoyed 1676 programs so far, 132,000 people and all thanks to our incredible Teaching Team birds, Raptor Backers, and kind understanding from Tom and Mom!



The first Raptor Ranch was on the Clark Fork River in Clinton, a rental property and remodeled barns and corrals. Then the big move and we bought 10 acres on the Bitterroot River in Florence, all new enclosures constructed with bird comfort and safety as the rule. All of the planted trees, shrubs and vines now provide ample shade, and sure makes me proud.

MISSION STATEMENT

Raptors of the Rockies is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) raptor education project located in Western Montana. Four Federal and State Permits are required. Starting in 1988, our mission has been:

- * To educate schools and the public through the use of live birds - the falcons, hawks, eagles and owls used in raptor education and wildlife art programs;
- * To provide a lifetime of quality care to permanently disabled birds of prey and falconry birds;
- * To instill a sense of respect and admiration for these skilled hunters and to promote wildlife conservation and habitat preservation for our wild bird populations;
- * To encourage everyone to go outdoors.

Landing on the just-snowplowed runway we were met at the school by 250 k-12 students, their parents, and guests - all of Stanford! Jeanne gave a nice talk on aviation history, then the Teaching Team Rock Stars. Back to Stevi just at dark, a sucker hole in the clouds and home with dreams of being a pilot some day. Could happen...



Program On the Left Coast



The 29th Annual Skagit Flats Raptor Survey, Team 4 with Head of Operations/Hero

In February I was invited to be the keynote speaker for a raptor census on the Washington Coast north of Seattle, and what a thrill. This was the greatest audience EVER for a PowerPoint Raptors of the Rockies program, and thanks Bud Anderson for the invitation and privilege. Bud heads the Falcon Research Group, and I met him at a conference in Veracruz Mexico in 2006, The River of Raptors migration location. Since then we have been the best of friends with my inclusion of his Southern Cross Peregrine Project in my falcon book, radiotagging tundra birds in Chile and following them to breeding grounds in the Arctic Circle. One bird made the loop migration 8 times (!) her transmitter finally quitting as she returned to Chile in November 2016! Absolutely amazing.

In the photo below Bud's intro and pal Ed Deal is tallying the census numbers for the morning. One group saw 127 Bald Eagles, no fair. Totals for the 100 or so hawkophiles were 706 Bald Eagles, 248 Red-tails, 128 Harriers, 32 Rough-legs, and a surprising 39 kestrels, birds that had been declining in numbers but a good showing that day. And, drum-roll please, 15 Peregrines, Peale's the one I saw. I was signing books at the finale of the program and a man shook my hand and offered, "You should do this for a living." I couldn't tell if he was kidding. I was encouraged to produce a new book with Mountain Press- *Falcons of North America: New and Revised*, the first version out in 2008.

Peanut The Golden Retriever!

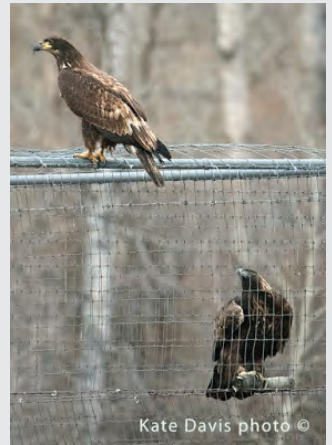
Running like a young gazelle and rolling in the snow, with Sibley flying all over One Horse Creek this afternoon. They are both 15 years young!

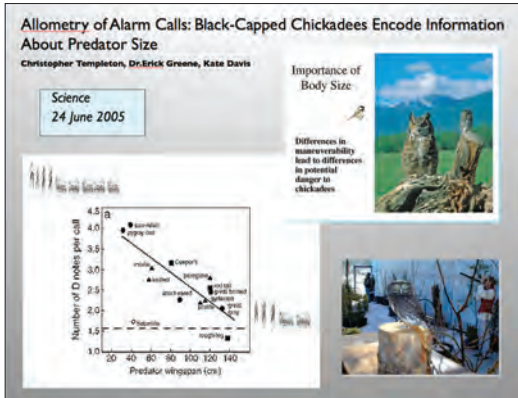

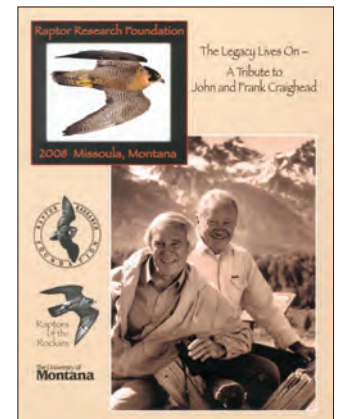

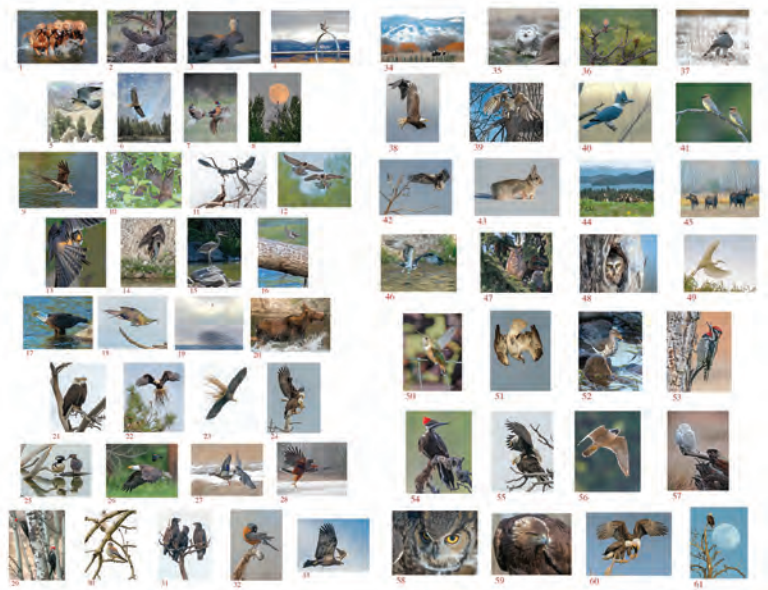
Dastardly Bald Eagles Disappoint



This would have been the seventh year in a row to have an active Bald Eagle nest just a quick walk from the house down at the Bitterroot River. This pair appeared eager to continue the ritual, nearly always near the nest all winter, bringing in sticks, copulating, everything that would say breeding again. We observe the nest from a scope in the living room, no cottonwood leaves this time of year to obstruct the view. Incubation began last year on March 5th and March 12th in 2016, but nothing this year. It sounds a bit nuts, but just picture a white head with yellow flashes of beak a half mile away which meant incubation had begun. A trip to the beach had been an evening ritual all summer and fall, taking dogs and camera and tripod, but perhaps not so frequently in 2018. Instead...PRINTMAKING! Maybe.

We'll still see the eagles and perhaps they won't chase every single Osprey away in nest defense over the summer. No reason by the way, just eagles overreacting plus stealing Ospreys' fish. As my friend Barry Gordon asks me all the time, "How many Bald Eagle pictures do you need, anyway?" Maybe more otters and kingfishers, love the Spotted Sandpipers and Killdeer. My Happy Place even has a Pileated Woodpecker nest that was occupied by a Bufflehead (duck!) the last few years. There will be something to "shoot" with the Nikon D810.

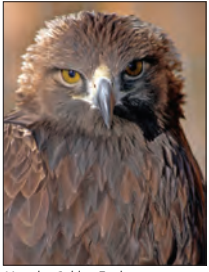

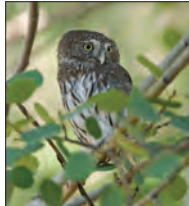

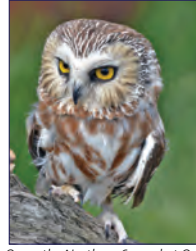
